Other projects and ideas:

Outdoors: Have a walk around Ilkley and notice what services are available to children, such as: the skatepark, lido, library, park, Clip and Climb etc. Would any of these things have been available to children 100 years ago? Take photos of the buildings and make notes.



History: Visit the toy museum in Ilkley to see the kind of toys children played with in the past. Interview a parent or grandparent about what life was like for them growing up. What toys did they play with? Did they have a television or a computer? What did they watch or play? What did they wear? What music did they listen to? Jot down your answers to share in class



Art: Look at the paintings of LS Lowry. Can you find any of children playing in the 1950s? Try to create a picture of children playing in the style of Lowry.
